Create a Realistic Scenario

Safety First's training system does not create any hazards allowing fire extinguisher training to be done in the work place. Performing training seminars in the actual setting where workers or residents may encounter a hazard will make occupants more comfortable using a fire extinguisher, should there be an emergency.

Safety First can simulate Class A, B, and C fires at four different difficulty levels to create a scenario appropriate to each individual workplace. The digital flames respond only to the actions of the trainee, and the system measures how well the participant extinguishes the flames, guaranteeing that all participants are using the extinguisher properly.
